The State Budget and the OHV Trust Fund

The State budget crisis has been resolved, at least temporarily. Every possible funding cut has been implemented and many important state programs have been eliminated. The OHV Trust Fund was forced to loan the general fund even more beyond the \$90M. But that said, the Trust Fund and the Grants program was preserved and the 2009-2010 grants are now funded. It could have been worse.

"After nearly 20 hours in session, lawmakers came to an agreement on a budget. The agreement was reached by cutting billions of dollars from almost all state programs, borrowing heavily from local governments, reducing state workers' pay through furloughs and reforming some of the ways in which the state does business.

As some of you will remember, back in 2003, the Legislature appropriated \$22M for acquisitions of non-motorized buffer lands in the vicinity of Prairie City SVRA, Onyx, and the Central Valley (Bakersfield). The remainder of these funds, approximately \$17M, were reverting this year. We had hoped to have the Legislature "reappropriate" these funds again this year, but they were unable to do so. Instead they are being transferred to the General Fund in this budget cycle.



In addition, the Legislature transferred the \$5.6M which was to be used for Route Designation and implementation for the BLM and USFS.

The total amount to be transferred from the OHMVR Trust Fund is \$22M. This is considered a loan. However, unlike the \$90 million which was borrowed from the OHV Trust Fund earlier in the year and is supposed to be repaid in 2013, there is no date specified for repayment of this loan.

Motor vehicle fuel tax from off road use makes up 85% of the revenue that funds OHV recreation in California. Other sources such as Green Sticker fees and SVRA entrance fees make up the rest. Expenditures from the OHV Trust Fund must be to enhance OHV recreation, but OHV funds also finance environmental protection programs and even return \$8M annually to State Parks for "administration".

CORVA receives early notification of all developments related to the OHV Trust Fund through our Sacramento connections. Timely notices will be posted on the CORVA website. Thanks to all of you who wrote letters of opposition to the unfair diversion of OHV Funds to other purposes. We owe tremendous thanks to those who set up the OHV Trust Fund and endowed it with significant protection under the law.


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
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WHAT IS CORVA?

Last month, along with many CORVA volunteers, I attended the "America Great Outdoors Listening Session" held at Occidental College in Eagle Rock. The Obama administration created these sessions supposedly to listen to what people had to say about how they use outdoor recreation and public areas. However, we were the ones listening. One after another, the politicians took time to congratulate each other on the fine job they are all doing. The Mayor of Los Angeles was 30 minutes late, causing the program to start late and it became obvious that the Off-Road participants would not be given a chance to speak. We were not on their agenda. The public comment time was cut in half and the so-called random questions from the crowd concerned urban parks and the [mayor's] new plan to turn the Los Angeles River into a Park. I kept wondering if any of them remembered that the LA River is a completely cement-lined flood control channel, or that the brilliant plan to develop it for dry-season use was shot down by environmentalists years ago. And have you ever seen the LA River? Anyway, we did have special breakout sessions after the public meeting and in the smaller group settings many OHV participants gave positive comments. But I wonder how many of our comments will really ever make it back to the ears of the administration. Still, we Off-Roaders made a good showing. Thank you for participating on so little notice.


The Sacramento Bee launched another attack recently on the State Park system and strongly criticized the OHV Division – particularly the Oceano Dunes/Pismo Beach area on law enforcement issues. The report leads us to believe that over 5000 "hard contacts" or arrests had been made in the last year at the area. In actuality, while the rangers made 5000 reports – for things as simple as the location of the nearest restrooms and how to treat a bad sun-burn, the real "hard contacts" were around 250 – not bad for an area that is one of the busiest in the entire state.

Since I hadn't actually ever been on the beach there, I took my Jeep, and along with some friends, went to experience this OHV treasure. I wanted to see first hand how really "bad" this park was and was I ever surprised. First, this isn't only an OHV area – it's a Multiple-use area. Half of the park is for beach and water play. There were hundreds of families, fishermen and surfers – just like at any other beach – all enjoying the sand, surf, food and fun. Secondly, past this first portion of the beach, is a small – much smaller than you realize – area just for OHV use. Because the area is so far away from everything, families are allowed to tow trailers and rigs to camp just at the edge of the water. (Any further up the beach and they would get stuck.) There is an entire economy surrounding this portion of the beach as well. There is a special tow unit, quad rentals and even a team to refill Jeep tires for the way home. Thirdly, everyone – the regular beach users, fishermen, surfers and OHV users were all getting along just fine. The fact that the State Park rangers were there and visible helped enforce this cooperation. I was amazed at how well it all worked. I can't understand why we can't continue to use and enjoy this wonderful, albeit small portion, of our public land. Yet the attacks continue, as you will read in our Land Use report concerning Air Quality standards for the Pismo area.

The CORVA Board voted to support Ecologic partners on the WEMO (Mojave) law suit with a donation of \$3,000.00. This lawsuit will have a huge effect on our deserts and we hope to hear a decision this month. The CORVA Board also voted to join California Outdoor Heritage Association – a huge advocacy group that represents outdoor recreation, fishing and hunting organizations, as well as all forms of OHV opportunity. We see this partnering with a diverse group representing all outdoor recreation interests as a huge positive for CORVA members. Please visit their web site www.outdoorheritage.org.

CORVA and the California Association of Four Wheel Drive Clubs (CA4WDC) are preparing a 2010 California Voters Guide for the November elections. The committee includes our Northern Regional Director - Amy Granat, Northern Clubs representative - Diana Mead, CORVA Life member and CA4WDC liaison - Helen Baker and CORVA past Treasurer - Roberta Woods. Together our two organizations share in our opposition to the Feinstein Wilderness bill (S2921) as well as other land use issues. We can no longer hope that any other OHV organization will ask the tough questions necessary of our representatives or those hoping to represent us in government. By preparing and providing this guide, we will assist the thousands of OHV users Statewide. The results along with the questions and actual answers will be available by October.

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CORVA Land Use Resources and Public Policy Report

We all knew 2010 would be a challenging year for OHV recreation, and our expectations are certainly being met. We are witnessing an unprecedented push by conservation advocates to lock up public lands, and even to control uses on adjacent private land. Ironically this is being driven more by the pressure from renewable energy development and the encroachment of urban development on public lands than by perceived impacts from recreational uses. But make no mistake, conservation groups are well connected, well funded, and highly motivated to push their agenda. Just a few years ago it seemed like there was room for everyone to use public land, but those days are gone and there is now a major movement to lock it up once and for all.

It is abundantly clear that recreation groups can no longer conduct business as they have in the past or hope to have much left in the sense of places for recreation. We need new and much bigger alliances to be effective. We are going to have to educate recreation groups such as hunters, fisherman, horsemen, rock hounds, houndsmen, and hikers that their access to public lands will be affected by coming change. It is no longer solely about dirt bikes, quads and 4X4's; this will affect everyone who visits America's public lands.

Forest Service Planning Regulations on the Fast Track for Completion by Year's End

The U.S. Forest Service is beginning the process of revising their regulations that govern how the agency prepares Forest Plans. Known as the "Planning Rule," these regulations will be the driving force behind the way in which the agency prepares Land Use Plans and will guide land managers in developing, amending, and revising land management plans for the 155 national forests and 20 grasslands in the National Forest System (NFS). CORVA representatives have participated in sessions held in California and have actively promoted recreation as an important consideration.

The USFS has released a proposed action that includes "Principles" that will be used to formulate the new regulations. The agency is asking for comments on these principles, and is asking the public to identify important issues and alternatives. Conservation and restoration will receive new emphasis according to the proposal.

Clear Creek Management Area Update

The deadline for comments has passed. We are now waiting for the comments to be considered and the Record of Decision to be announced early in 2011.

CORVA, Blue Ribbon Coalition, AMA District 36, and many other OHV organizations have developed a strategy to address this controversial plan.

The Blue Ribbon Coalition recently sent out a press release citing data gleaned from a recent Freedom of Information Act request filed in May 2009. The letter specifically points to the fact that the agency summarily dismissed important information or questions submitted by BLM staff or by BRC consultants during the public scoping period which followed the functional closure of the of the entire 75,000 acre Clear Creek Management Area (CCMA) on May 1, 2008, to all public uses.

The letter, signed by Paul Turcke, an attorney for the Blue Ribbon Coalition, highlights a number of the documents obtained, such as a memo authored by BLM experts seeking underlying data and questioning methodology relied upon by the EPA in its May, 2008 report that forms the basis for BLM's closure of the CCMA.

The future of Clear Creek is seen by all as a precedent setting national issue that will have repercussions for the future of OHV recreation for years to come.

BLM Officials Meet with CORVA to Discuss OHV Policy

"The OHV community will have to play a more active role in both acquiring and maintaining public lands for OHV recreation."

BLM state officials recently held discussions with CORVA representatives. Existing designated routes will continue to be available for use, but new OHV areas will probably require public/private partnerships for acquisition and management. Current BLM holdings may have to be expanded through private acquisitions, and more of the management responsibility will have to be assumed by outside entities because of the lack of available resources within the agency. The Counties, generally uninvolved but sharing the responsibility for recreation, should become more involved and help fill this role.

"There is simply not that much land available for OHV recreation given the existing limitations of OHV use on public lands".

BLM cited difficulties with providing law enforcement and the high cost of managing OHV recreation areas as concerns. The BLM has spent millions to defend areas such as the Imperial Dunes against opposition from environmentalists. The agency expects use of existing designated routes and areas to continue, but states that in the desert, "traditional use may have to change", and cites military expansion, national monument proposals, and energy projects as competing factors that will affect OHV recreation.

"We need to start thinking "outside the box" to develop new concepts of OHV opportunity. OHV will have to coexist with other uses. Large areas set aside for OHV recreation have proven extremely difficult to manage."

As land manager, BLM is obligated to consider OHV together with all other forms of recreation. "When user conflict or resource damage becomes a problem, it's difficult to keep those areas open". Some segregation of OHV use will be necessary. "Multiple use" works best when use of an area is light, but the concept begins to fail as use increases.

Red Rock State Park General Plan Update

The Red Rock General Plan update has been under development since 2006. It is designed to update the plan to include expansion of the park that has occurred with the addition of areas such as Last Chance Canyon and Nightmare Gulch. Comments are still being accepted, so please take the time to submit your thoughts on the use of this important area.

General Plans such as this one are frequently delayed. Look for future announcements. We support use of Red Rock the way it is; the Plan revision is not necessary from our point of view.

Forest Service Travel Management – (Route Designation)

The CORVA Comments Project Team is hard at work on the many Travel Management draft EIS's being published by the Forest Service. Travel Management will determine where you can ride in California's National Forests.

The CORVA Comments Project team recently submitted over 50 comment letters on the Sierra National Forest DEIS in conjunction with the Stewards of the Sierra. Sierra NF is the site of many OHV opportunities and events including the Bass Lake Dual Sport, the Dusy-Ersham and Spanish Lakes 4x4 trails as well as other important routes. The requests for an extension filed by CORVA members helped get us more time to research the document, which is over 500 pages. The Comments team is now hard at work on The Sierra National Forest Travel Management DEIS comment period closed on June 30.

Region 5 has released an unprecedented number of draft EIS's simultaneously. Comment periods of Draft EIS's for the Klamath, Six Rivers, and Lassen National Forests have now closed.

The CORVA Comments Team is awaiting the release of Records of Decision from Inyo National Forest, Sequoia National Forest, and Tahoe National Forest. The Team will then begin analyzing these documents and preparing a response.

"Federal lawmakers are going to get needed changes made," said Ed Moreland, AMA vice president for government relations. "But while the measure has cleared the House, it still needs to earn full Senate approval. Concerned riders are encouraged to contact their U.S. Senators to encourage them to support H.R. 689 and approve it as quickly as possible."

New Safety Regulations Proposed At Oceano Dunes

The California State Parks Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Recreation Division is proposing revisions to the safety regulations for Oceano Dunes State Vehicle Recreation Area. The current regulations require a whip and flag for non-street legal vehicles. The new proposal would require a whip and flag for every vehicle in the dunes. This requirement would be consistent with the regulations for Dumont Dunes and Imperial Sand Dunes Recreation Areas, which are popular areas managed by the Bureau of Land Management.

California Desert Conservation and Recreation Act Taking Shape

The California Wilderness Coalition (CWC) has been holding meeting with representatives of US Senator Feinstein to establish new wilderness areas in the California Desert. CORVA has been invited to attend stakeholder meetings and provide critical input as the bill takes shape. We have a very experienced and highly-qualified group working on this issue. You should be proud of your CORVA representatives.

The new CWC wilderness proposal includes a reduced number of new wilderness areas and National Park expansions within Inyo, San Bernardino, Imperial, and San Diego Counties. New wilderness areas proposed by the California Wilderness Coalition include the Great Falls Basin north of Trona, the Avawatz Mountains, the Cady Mountains, Soda Mountain, the Kingston Range and the San Gorgonio Mountains. There have been reports that the Slate Mountains and the Malpais Mesa in the Inyo Mountains around Cerro Gordo have been removed from the proposal. The proposal includes Wild and Scenic River designation for Surprise Canyon and the upper section of the Amargosa near Shoshone that was donated for conservation purposes by the landowner. Areas in the northern Panamint Valley and the northern section of Death Valley National Park are likely to be included. CORVA land use specialists have reviewed every one of these areas and have recommended that existing routes be kept open. Most of these areas are not OHV recreation destinations.

As previously announced by Senator Feinstein, there will be a Mojave National Monument that includes land donated by Catellus Corporation for conservation purposes, land donated by the Wildlands Conservancy, and existing wilderness areas. Relatively little of the land within the proposed Monument is presently open for OHV recreation, and it appears that motorized travel on existing designated routes within the Monument will be preserved.

This bill is a unique opportunity for the OHV community to be at the table during the drafting of a major conservation bill. For the first time any of us can recall we are being taken seriously as stakeholders. This affirms that OHV recreation is a valid use of public lands. This represents a major advance compared to the Boxer - McKeon bill where negotiations were much more contentious.

CORVA is working to preserve traditional uses of the desert including "off roading" but also equestrian endurance rides, mountain biking, and vehicle access for such activities as gem and mineral collecting, spring wildflower viewing, and family backcountry touring and picnic outings. Special thanks is due to Helen and Harry Baker, Randy Banis, Mark Howlett, Dave Beaumont, Ron Schiller, Wayne Nosala, Matt Hensel, Bob Ham and the many others who have worked very hard on this proposal.

Johnson Valley

Discussions regarding this critical area for OHV recreation continue. Although the military has indicated some willingness to accommodate existing uses of the area, it seems likely that much of Johnson Valley will ultimately be included in the base expansion. At this point we are awaiting the release of the draft EIS that will reveal the alternatives under consideration.

CORVA submitted comments on the notice of intent to prepare a draft EIS prepared by the Marines. The deadline for comments was January 30, 2009, however it is frequently the case that comments continue to be accepted after the deadline. If you sent comments, thanks!!

BLM Solar Energy Programmatic EIS and its Effect on OHV Recreation

We received the following information. Only four solar areas were named in California:

- <u>Imperial East</u> -- 12,830 acres between I-8 and the Mexico border, about 5-10 miles west of the Imperial Sand Dunes Recreation Area (aka Glamis)
- Iron Mountain -- 109,642 acres north of Hwy 62 adjacent to Rice, 5-10 miles northeast of Joshua Tree National Park (JTNP)
- Pisgah -- 26,282 acres to the north and south of I-40 in the Troy Lake area between Newberry Springs and Ludlow.
- Riverside East -- a 202,295 acre swarthy along the north of I-10, with a large cluster at Desert Center, immediately adja cent to JTNP, and another large cluster northeast of Blyth.

The Pisgah study area overlaps some of what was part of the proposed Cady's wilderness, as does the Solar One project. Further, on July 7 we received the following clarifications from the California Desert District Office:

"The segregation of Solar Energy Study Areas does not affect motorized access via designated open routes of travel during its two-year period. These study areas are the only study areas that will be analyzed in the Programmatic Environmental Impact Statement. As for numbers of applications inside and outside the study areas, it's easiest for us to count the number inside, which we believe to be 26."

ATV Safety Training

In the 1980's, the OHV commission developed an ATV Safety program because Red Rock State Park would not let families through the park with Green Sticker motorcycles or Quads. The presiding Director of State Parks, Henry Agonia, then made it a condition that we come up with an ATV training program, before families could go through Red Rock State Parks, which are a key link between the El Paso BLM Area and the Dove Springs BLM area.



Copy this link to your internet's address bar, and you will be well on your way. After choosing what class is needed, you will be asked to create a user name/password before seeing an ASI ATV Safety Online Training Course video.

Remember, it is required by law that persons 16 years of age and younger have a certificate in their possession. Take the online course, and enjoy riding legally.


